Navigating Transition

hink of a time of transition in your life -- maybe it was a marriage, the birth of a child, or the loss of a job -- and reflect on how you felt during that time. Were you Excited? Sad? Angry? Confused? Perhaps it was a combination of feelings.

Transitions force us to confront many conflicting emotions, and to ask ourselves very basic questions: Who am I now? Who will I be after this transition? Am I headed in a healthy direction? Is this an opportunity for growth?

When Ed Bacon announced his retirement last year, All Saints Church began the necessary and difficult process of asking itself these same kinds of questions: What does it mean to be All Saints? Who will we be without Ed?

The Vestry of All Saints seeks to create a space of open, honest, safe, and compassionate questioning, recognizing that healthy transitions lead to healthy change, and healthy change leads to healthy and vital communities.

To support this process, the Vestry has authorized the creation of the Transition Life Committee (TLC), whose mission is to:

- Support the parish during the transition period by offering workshops, book groups, and other events around the theme of transitions;
- Plan events to say goodbye to Ed;
- Welcome the new rector to a healthy and vibrant faith community.

The TLC recognizes that no two people will react to any transition in the same way, but research has shown that most will experience some or all of the following three stages:

• Endings. This period can be marked by sadness, anger, even grief, as the awareness of an impending change takes hold. Because this period is often one of reflection on the past, of asking What has All Saints been in my life?, there is always the possibility of old wounds being reopened, or hidden patterns being exposed. This is a normal, if difficult, part of transition. At the same time, looking back can also give us a clear picture of what we do well, and can

- help confirm and strengthen our core values.
- The Neutral Zone. The "in-between" time. This period can feel like wandering aimlessly. Because it is so fluid and difficult, most of us would rather move through it quickly. Experts in Institutional Transitions, however, have shown that the Neutral Zone can be a time of incredible creativity, as the inertia built up over years of relative stability starts to break down, releasing built-up creative energy. The result is that everything, from programming all the way down to basic institutional structures, is up for re-examination. This is a time to plan, to dream, and to ask "What do we want All Saints to be?"
- Beginnings. This is a time of renewed energy, focus, and growing excitement. Dreams start to become reality, ideas are implemented, as we begin to adjust to the new situation. This is a time for us to focus on the future, to jump in to new projects, and to ask "Where is All Saints headed, and how can I use my skills and passions as part of that journey?"

The story of Jesus' 40 days of wandering, prayer, and fasting can be instructive during transition times. Jesus left everything that was familiar because he knew that he could not ignore the call of God. During his wilderness experience, as he prayed and listened, he was tempted to fall back into old patterns, to do what everyone expected him to do, and to play it safe--caring only for his own survival. Jesus listened to God, and came out of the desert with a new purpose of self-offering and love and a clear vision.

Let us, as a faith community, use this transition time to follow Jesus' example! If we commit ourselves to listen, pray, discern, and struggle together as a community, All Saints can emerge from this period with a clear vision and strengthened purpose to bring hope, peace, and love to the world.

The General Convention of the Episcopal Church in Salt Lake City

The General Convention of the Episcopal Church meets every three years and is the only council of the church authorized to speak for the whole church. Two legislative houses (Deputies - who are laity and clergy -- and Bishops) will meet in Salt Lake City from June 25-July 3 to consider a vast array of issues and opportunities. High on the list in 2015 are proposals to restructure and streamline the institutional church; to make canonical and liturgical changes to bless and celebrate marriages between same-sex couples and a plethora of social and economic justice resolutions. The work of General Convention is deeply prayerful work done in the context of daily worship and ongoing prayer and reflection. Attending from All Saints this year will be Jim White (who is the chair of the deputation from the Diocese of Los Angeles), Susan Russell (who is a first alternate deputy and will be coordinating the legislative team working for marriage equality) and Mel Soriano (who is the Communication Director for Integrity - the LGBT caucus.)
