It is with great excitement that we announce the appointment of Weicheng Zhao as our new associate organist-choirmaster, effective September 1. In addition to being a brilliant musician, he is a wonderful human being with a warm and engaging personality.

Born in Tianjin, China, Weicheng Zhao began his musical training at the age of five. After receiving a Bachelor of Music degree in 2008, he was appointed a full time faculty member

of the Electone Organ at the Tianjin Conservatory of Music. He came to the United States in 2009 to pursue study of the pipe organ with Professor Cherry Rhodes at the University of Southern California, Thornton School of Music. Upon completing the Master of Music degree in organ

performance, he received the distinction as the Outstanding Graduate at the master's level of the entire School of Music. He is currently enrolled in the Doctor of Musical Arts degree at USC.

Among numerous scholarships and awards, Weicheng was the first prize winner in

the 43rd Yamaha International Electronic Organ Competition, first prize winner in the Miami International Organ Competition and the Los Angeles International Liszt Competition. Mr. Zhao received the Second Prize and the Audience Prize in the prestigious Ruth and Clarence Mader National Organ-Playing Competition in 2010 and 2013. He has been organist at St. Bede's Church in La Cañada since 2012.

I know you will enjoy getting to know Weicheng and his wife, Fang Gao, who is a gifted violinist in the Graduate Certificate program at USC.


FCP Shopping Spree

July's Conscientious Projector: *Aluna,* for the Old Pasadena Film Festival

In 1990, noted British author, historian and filmmaker Alan Ereira's classic BBC documentary From the Heart of the World: The Elder Brothers' Warning was first broadcast. It brought global attention to the centuries-old indigenous Kogi tribe, an ancient "lost" Colombian civilization previously unknown to the rest of the world, who saw themselves as guardians of the earth. In recent years, Ereira returned to the Kogi to document their renewed call for humanity to recognize the interconnectedness of all life, a message they brought to New York City in their first venture into the "civilized" world. The result is the stirring documentary Aluna (translated as "the mind inside nature"), this month's Conscientious Projector feature screening on Thursday, July 9, 7:00 p.m. at Armory Center for the Arts as part of the Old Pasadena Film Festival. 


