ear permeates the followers of Jesus. "Is the door locked?" "Yes, it's locked!" They cower in a locked room, afraid of reprisals from the government. Their beloved leader has been crucified, and there is a great possibility that they will be next. As they begin to relax from their terror, a deep sadness replaces the fear. This great enterprise of healing and teaching good news is over. The mission has come to an end.

If the weary disciples had been able to access William Bridges' book *Transitions: Making Sense of Life's Changes*, they would have understood that this great loss, this ending, is but the first phase, and a precondition of self-renewal. The work of Jesus' disciples is to say goodbye to a life they would much rather cling to. They must move into that dark unknown where nothing is comfortable and the voice of God seems muffled by a raging storm all around them. These individuals who had found in Jesus an incredible new life of hope and energy must now loosen their grip on that life and those hopes.

After an *Ending*, Bridges describes the *Neutral Zone*, a fallow time where, like a field between growing seasons, we begin to dismantle the old life. Bridges describes a man who had lost his job and his marriage. "He had several experiences of *seeing*, as he called it. 'I feel as though I've broken through a wall and can see

the world for the first time,' he said with real meaning." This is the time for Jesus' disciples to regroup—to process their loss and to realize what they had learned from their mentor and friend.

The final stage is a new *Beginning*. Few people could top the jumpstart the disciples experienced when, three days after his death, the stone was rolled from the tomb and Jesus appeared to them. From this experience they gained the energy to spread the message of new life to everyone everywhere. Bridges says for most people in this phase it is inner signals that bring a sense of a beginning—an inner idea or an external opportunity. It is not necessarily a "logical sign of validity but the 'resonance' it sets up in us."

We and our beloved rector are experiencing our own processes of major change, counting down Ed's last Homecoming, last Christmas, and now last Easter before May 1, his last Sunday. To assist with this major transition, the parish is invited to attend one of the following Listening Sessions: an afternoon session on Thursday, March 3, 12:30-2:00 p.m. following Senior Saints; evening sessions Tuesday, March 8, or Thursday, March 10, 7:00-8:30 p.m.; or a session designed for children, youth and families on Friday, March 18, 6:00-7:30 p.m.

Money Matters!

oney-Saving Energy Tips: With daily temperatures like a roller coaster these days, here are some money-saving energy tips you can use in your home or rental unit.



Turn it Two: Turn your heat down 2 degrees and TRANSFORM your AC up 2 degrees

- Ceiling fan: When using heat, turn your ceiling fan to gently push warm air down (and the opposite when using AC)
- Cross-ventilate: Open windows on opposite ends of your home
- Seal those cracks: Use caulking or weather stripping around windows and doors
- Clean the vents: Vacuum your HVAC vents regularly and replace the filters regularly (don't forget about the vent on your fridge)
- Close the vents: Close HVAC vents in rooms not in use
- Plant around your house: Plant drought-resistant evergreen shrubs around your home to insulate from cold and heat (can help on apartment balconies, too!)
- Shorten your shower: Shave 2-3 minutes off your daily shower
- Save some water: Install energy-saving shower heads and faucet flow restrictors
- Full loads: Wash and dry full loads of laundry (and air dry when possible)
- Use the dishwasher: Run full loads more than the sink
- Turn down the water temp: Set your hot water heater at 120 degrees
- Change the bulbs: Install energy-efficient light bulbs
- Use power strips with appliances/entertainment centers. Unplug them when not in use
- Window shades: When it's cold, let the sun in. When it's hot, keep it out.

Dan Siegel Returns for Soul and Synapse

Te will welcome Dr. Daniel Siegel back to All Saints Church on Saturday and Sunday, Mar. 12-13 for "Soul and Synapse: The Integration of Science and Spirituality." In this contemplative retreat, through the learning and use of current meditation and mindfulness practices, we will explore the integration of science and spirituality and experience the ways in which our inner subjective lives, our interpersonal relationships, and our objective empirical knowledge can be woven together to illuminate the importance of meaning, connection, and equanimity in our lives.

Utilizing experiential exercises engaging the deep nature of our subjective inner and interpersonal lives, we will address such questions as: why does feeling part of "a larger whole" matter so much, and why does not simply living as an isolated self, limited to our skin-defined boundaries, improve our immune system functioning? What are the scientific insights that reveal why a spiritual life with meaning and connection is "good for you?"
