# Resilience and Faith: Riding the Roller Coaster of Life

t All Saints, we strive to create a safe place where youth are encouraged to engage the complexity of the world that we live in, and to take head on the challenge of being an inclusive person of faith in the diverse communities that we are all a part of. When thinking about what it means to be a young person, many of us find ourselves reflecting on all of the awkward and difficult changes we went through in junior and senior high—and we often breathe a sigh of relief for being past that time of our life where everything was constantly new and changing.

The reality is that all of us, whether we are adults or youth, are constantly growing and learning new things. The difference between adults and youth is that sometimes adults forget this reality.

We fall into the trap of believing that we have everything taken care of and figured out. Our young people, on the other hand, are well aware of the constant change and learning happening in their lives, whether it's occurring at school, or at church, or in their relationships with peers and other adults.

This past Wednesday, in senior high youth group, we spent some time working on an individual activity that we called the "transition coaster." The main idea behind this activity was to help our youth explore what transitions look like through the metaphor of a roller coaster. Point A represents the beginning of the coaster, while point B represents its end. The coaster ride between points A and B represents the many transitions we face throughout our lives. After hearing the metaphor explained, the youth were asked to think about the

different dips, peaks, loops, and drops of the roller coaster, and to spend some time reflecting on how those physical features of the roller coaster related to transitions in their own personal lives. Following a brief period of reflection, we all came together to share our thoughts.

The first question the group was asked was, "How did it feel working on your coaster?" A few of the youth responded by saying that it was an interesting and engaging exercise, and that it forced them, in a good way, to dig a little deeper into their feelings. Other students talked about how transi-

> tions can seem easy at first but can quickly become chaotic and leave them with feelings of self doubt. Some youth shared their own stories about how they ground themselves when they are

in the midst of a chaotic transition, while others talked about how dance, reading, writing, contemplation and community play a big role in helping them remain grounded when they are going through a tough transition. At the end of the evening we talked about the reality that, even in the midst of a difficult transition, that "it too shall pass," and that we can find confidence in knowing that change is an important and necessary part of how we grow as human beings.

We consider it a deep privilege and honor to work with all of the amazing young people who are a part of the All Saints community. We are grateful to be partners with them on their journey of life and faith, and we continue to look forward to all of the hard and engaging work that lies ahead—not just as youth ministers, but as adults as well.

# Weicheng Zhao in National Organ Finals!

ur brilliant Associate Organist, Weicheng Zhao, will compete this June in the final rounds of the prestigious National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance of the American Guild of Organists (AGO). Last fall, 46 young organists from across the U.S. submitted recordings for the preliminary round, and Weicheng was chosen as one of nine finalists. The semifinal round will be held Wednesday, June 15, at the Church of the Transfiguration in Dallas, Texas. Five finalists will then be selected and play at the final round on Saturday, June 18, at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Houston, as part of the national AGO convention. ## **Money Matters!**
