Imagine, then, how your friends' lives can be changed, and how the Pasadena community might be changed by the magnitude of our service and giving. Imagine what God is calling us into in the year ahead and how, in us and through us, God in all her creativity will draw upon all that we have accomplished together so we can dream of even greater things to come.

With the future in mind, I am thrilled to announce a number of exciting changes from the Giving Office coming in the coming weeks and months.

Campaign for 2017

For many years the annual pledge campaign was held during four consecutive weeks in October. This year the Campaign for 2017 will unfold in a new way. Launching on Sunday, Oct. 9, the campaign will be woven throughout the fall. Some Sundays will have a strong presence in church, as parishioners share during the services and Zelda Kennedy, the Wardens and I offer campaign updates. Other Sundays will be quiet or only have updates, testimonials and news printed in the liturgies and posted in social media.

The most notable calendar change will be Presentation Sunday, when all pledges to date are printed on scrolls tied with ribbons and carried to the altar for a special blessing. Instead of Presentation Sunday being the last Sunday of October, it will be on January 8. Not only does this mirror the reality that pledges for 2017 will come in throughout the fall, it offers a wonderful way to launch our new fiscal year – which runs January through December. My one word of encouragement is to not wait until Presentation Sunday to pledge, so that we can include as many pledges as possible on the scrolls for this wonderful tradition.

I am also delighted that this fall we are launching three new ways you can support All Saints Church.

Employer Matching

Your 2017 pledges will make a huge difference in the impact we have in our church and in the surrounding communities. Your company's matching gift can help make that impact even greater! Companies of all sizes match employee contributions to a wide range of non-profit organizations, including faithbased organizations and organizations with major community outreach and social justice programs, such as All Saints.

Each company that matches contributions will have its own policy. Many companies match 1:1, meaning that if your pledge contribution to All Saints is \$100 your company will also donate \$100, for a total of \$200! While the matching gift is a separate contribution directly from your company and can't be applied toward your pledge, your employer's match could double the impact of your pledge. Imagine the possibilities of what we can accomplish if just some of our pledges can be matched!

Vehicle Donations

An easy way to give a special contribution is by donating your used car, truck, motorcycle, boat, RV or just about any other kind of vehicle. We are partnering with CARS so that it is as easy as possible for you to donate your unwanted vehicle. All you'll need to do is contact the Giving Office or visit our website to complete a brief form so your vehicle can be picked up. There is no cost to you and you'll even be able to deduct the gross sales price on your taxes. The best part is you will be able to give a contribution to support the mission of All Saints Church.

Text-to-Give

Many people want to give a contribution during church on Sundays, but do not carry cash or checks with them. I am very excited that we will be debuting text-to-give, a very easy and safe way to give. You will be able to text a certain number, complete a simple form, and be ready to give from the pew on Sunday mornings by a text message that takes less than 5 seconds.

If you already give contributions toward your pledge by cash, check, stock, or with automatic payments from your bank account or credit card please continue to do that! Text-to-give will simply provide an additional way to give during the offering – and we'll even have a small card in the pews to drop in the offering basket so you can participate in that sacred moment.

The coming year will be a thrilling chapter in our journey together. Your generous pledges for 2017 will provide the foundation for us to imagine what we can do together in church and in the community. Money Matters!

Your Digital Wallet

Chances are you've seen the small Apple Pay logo on the payment terminal in your local grocery store or another retail venue. Using the digital wallet in your smart phone, you can easily, quickly and securely pay for purchases. It can be as simple as clicking a button or touching your phone's fingerprint sensor while letting your phone pass by the payment terminal. Here are a few things to know about this new technology, known as your "digital wallet":



- It is more secure than you think. Using your phone's digital wallet is extremely safe. Retailers can't access to your debit or credit card number, as in normal transactions, because each transaction generates a random transaction number. Further, your card number is not stored anywhere on your phone, and account information accessed via your phone's mobile pay app is encrypted and only accessed using passwords (just like your bank account) or even your fingerprint. If you lose your credit or debit card, your bank can reissue new card information immediately to your mobile pay app, without waiting for a new card to arrive in the mail. And finally, if you lose your phone not only is it password or fingerprint protected, you can also lock your digital wallet remotely.
- **Use different credit or debit cards.** They help clients do this all the time so ask for their help. Take detailed notes so you know how to complete the paperwork properly.
- It is fast! Many new smart phones have fingerprint sensors, allowing you to simply hold your finger on it and place your phone near the payment terminal. Your phone will vibrate or beep so you know the payment was successful. Not only do you not have to open the mobile pay app, you don't even have to open your purse or actual wallet!



We Are All Saints: Spotlight on Bob Shull

An ongoing series spotlighting the amazing individuals who make up the "we" in We Are All Saints.

Parishioners at All Saints love to read. They love words and enjoy savoring them in search of a little extra meaning and contemplative kick. Bob Shull loves to be the purveyor of words to many in the church. If you've been around All Saints for a while you know him by sight.

You've passed by his table in front of Regas House on the quad, resplendent with printed transcripts of sermons and Rector's Forums – both recent and from the distant past – all of which were transcribed by Bob.

Bob came to All Saints in the early 1980's – searching, like most of us, for a welcoming and forward-thinking place to worship. He was instantly impressed with the high level of inclusiveness and quickly adapted to the church's liturgical ceremony despite his Adventist background. Because of some shakeups in his family life, Bob took

a hiatus from All Saints for a few years in the mid 80's, but he returned shortly after Ed Bacon began his tenure as Rector in 1995.

Bob's son Steven, at the tender age of 6, expressed a strong desire to be involved in the kids program at ASC and what father can say no to a child who WANTS to go to church! While Steven did participate with the youth at All Saints, Bob fondly remembers his son actually skipping Sunday School to sit with his dad and listen to the sermons and forum talks.

Bob first began serving the church after years of attending when the call went out for help with the Sermon Tape Ministry. For years ASC had provided audio cassette tapes of every Sunday sermon for folks who either needed to get caught up or wanted to review something that had struck them from the pulpit. And so, Bob took on running the Tape Table, as most folks still call it today.

It wasn't until Ed Bacon's sermon directly following the tragedy on September 11, 2001, that there was a call for a sermon to be transcribed so people could read it, and sit with it, and take some time to reap comfort from it. Bob turned that sermon into text, made it available the next Sunday, and the response was overwhelming. So began the era of Bob transcribing all the Sunday sermons, and later, the Rector's Forums. He also delved back into the archives and did the same for classic sermons and talks, recorded years before, that had altered, in ways big and small, the course of All Saints' mission and ministry. He has given us, in this way, many "chapters" in the written history of our church.

Week after week, writing out the sermons and Forum discussions is a labor of love, and Bob is incredibly fond of the task and revels in the opportunity to review each sermon and talk -- and, with each listening, find new meaning and understanding that he hadn't gleaned the time before.

He has one more passion as well. It is also his generous heart that has been supplying hard boiled eggs on the lawn on Sunday mornings for longer than most people can remember. Every week Bob – now with the help of a few friends – boils, peels and provides as many as 90 eggs to provide some early morning protein for our less-fortunate friends!

I asked Bob how he came to serve ASC in these ways. He replied that he just listened and when opportunity presented itself, he stepped forward. His weekly work at the Tape Table led him to see the need for more nutritious items at the snack table, for both our impoverished morning guests and ASC members alike – thus the boiled eggs. For those looking for ways to get involved at All Saints, Bob recommends just talking to people, listening, and being patient – the opportunity will arise. And if you see a need, perhaps it's up to you to fill it. Thanks Bob – for the eggs, the sermons – and the dedication that comes from your generous heart!

Political Activity in an Election Season

As the election cycle enters its final weeks a reminder of the policies in place for staff and volunteers to ensure that All Saints Church remains a partisan free zone: 1) No buttons for or against any candidate are to be worn; 2) No clothing advocating for or against a candidate is to be worn; 3) No advocacy for or against a candidate can be expressed at a table on the lawn—this applies to volunteers working ministry tables, to lay Eucharistic ministers, ushers, acolytes, choir members and staff in worship, and to employees while on campus or representing the parish at off-campus events; 4)Advocacy and the wearing of buttons or clothing expressing an opinion on non-partisan propositions is permissible.
