At All Saints we say "Whoever you are, and wherever you find yourself on the journey of faith, you are welcome to be here, just as you are."

That's about coming together. That's about a circle that has room for everyone.

When the women of Magdalene and Thistle Farms, women who have seen, as Becca says "the underside of bridges, the short side of justice, the back side of anger and the inside of prison walls," wrote this book of the 24 spiritual principles that guide their community, the very first principle was:

Come Together.
They wrote:
"We come on circuitous paths from prisons, from the streets, from churches because we are tired and we want to live in hope.
"We come in every color. We come lonely and afraid and do not want to die.
"We come because our bodies and spirits are sick and our teeth are falling out and we know we need help."

There is truth there for all of us.
We come together from many different places ... and we come together in hope ... we come together looking for life . we come together knowing we need something more than just ourselves.

We come together not in the place of strength but in the place of vulnerability.

We come together taking off the masks that the world tells us are our only presentable selves. The masks that hide our wounds and imperfections, our addictions and our failings.

We come together trusting that, as our brother Bryan Stephenson says, we are all so much more than the worst thing that we have done.

We come together in celebration and we come together in grieving. We come together to offer our gifts to God, to each other, and to the world. We come together to awaken joy in each other's hearts and to remind ourselves and one another that love is more powerful than anything that would try to tear us apart.

We come together because no matter where we are, we are better coming together than living separately.

This month, we are launching our 2019 giving campaign, and we are calling it Come Together. Because that's who we are and what we are about.

I hope you will give deeply and joyfully of yourself to this community so we can continue to become even more what All Saints Church has always been

This fall, Come together at All Saints Church. Come together so we can listen deeply to one another. Come together so we can become something new and amazing for the life of this church and for the life of the world.

Come together in generosity. Come together in joy. Come together ... and see what happens next.

## Spotlight Clara \& Steve Williams

The lives of Clara and Steven Williams created two equally remarkable columns in the notepad, each filled with parallel interests and unique experiences, all revolving around faith, music, education, and family.

Steven grew up in San Francisco and was raised in the Catholic Church. Clara grew up in Oakland.
Clara was the daughter of a faithful mother and an inquisitive father, who later became an AME pastor and was awarded his Doctorate in Divinity at age 80.

Clara's mother passed away when Clara was 17. Music became a strong support. Clara sang in the Church Of God In Christ state youth choir, which went on to become known as the renowned Edwin Hawkins Singers who recorded the original "Oh, Happy Day" in 1968. Steven met Clara when Steve's brother started playing bass guitar in another musical group with Clara. Steven became their equipment "roadie" for the group. Within the year Steven $\mathcal{E}$ Clara were married.

Clara attended San Jose State University and later received her law degree from the University of San Francisco Law School. Steven started out at as a premed major at UC Berkeley but left Berkeley to pursue a Broadcast Engineering career. Steven worked for CBS radio for three years as a broadcast radio engineer in San Francisco, and then began his music engineering career at Fantasy Records in Berkeley.

They moved to Los Angeles in 1978. Clara became a public defender for Los Angeles County, and later joined the Law Office of Johnnie Cochran. She worked 11 years as an administrative law judge and a staff council for Cal OSHA. She has also spent $25+$ years as co-founder of The Foothills Art Collective. Foothill Arts provides enrichment activities for at risk youth.

After a successful career in the music industry, Steven worked for NBCUniversal Studios for 14 years, the last 6 years as Vice President of Post-Production Services. He received an Emmy Award for his sound work on Jim Henson's "Muppet Babies" and more recently a Grammy Award as Producer for the HBO documentary "The Defiant Ones."

They have two daughters, Azizi and Malika, who have successful careers of their own.

## Seeing White <br> \author{ by Keith Holeman 

}Edna Trigg was surprised at the turnout for Seeing White: An Anti-racist Education Group, which premiered at All Saints on September 10. "Honestly, I was thinking maybe 5 people would show up -- so to have it be packed and to have to ask Buildings \& Grounds folks to bring in more chairs was amazing! I so appreciate that people are willing to do the work."

Seeing White is a group for white-identifying people in which they can listen and learn to better understand the American conversation about race and the stories we tell ourselves. It's presented by the Racial Justice Ministry (RJM), and they decided it needed to be run by white people for white people, so Elizabeth Kibbey took up the mantle. It's based on the Peabody-nominated podcast "Seeing White" hosted by John Biewen, and it meets on Monday evenings from 7-8:30 in the Guild Room. There are 10 sessions based on two podcast episodes per session. It is facilitated by Alexander Richard.

At one of the Racial Justice Ministry's general membership meetings recently they were brainstorming about the need to create a 'white affinity group,' and Claudia Owens Shields suggested they 'be careful of that because language counts' -- since "white affinity groups" could also conjure images in some people's minds of White Nationalists and the Ku Klux Klan. "It was Elizabeth (Kibbey) who came up with 'White Anti-Racist Education Group,'" Edna says. "So we had the will and we had the moniker, we just needed to have the content. Then in one of our Steering Committee meetings, Jenny Watts and Dewana Willis started talking about this podcast they had heard called 'Seeing White.'" The seed was planted and it eventually bore fruit as an anti-racist education group using the podcast as its foundation and primary resource.
"As a member of the ministry," Elizabeth says, "it was a part of our work in aligning ourselves with the Racial Justice Resolution, because the first point of the resolution is education. So this was a great opportunity to accomplish that. Then, of course, it's just the times that we're in right now."

Edna adds, "Another part of our resolution states that we want to create brave spaces for people to be able to talk and explore, but also it's important for us to move people into a place of discomfort. Because without that there isn't really any growth."

But they had to find the right facilitator. "I think we sensed that it might be nice to have somebody who was not only an 'expert,'" Elizabeth says with air quotes, "but also from the outside; someone who has a faith background, but who also has a background in this type of work, to come in and lead the group."

They consulted with friends at Fuller, and a man who was doing a podcast with one of those friends,

him," Edna says, "and we knew immediately that he was the one." Alexander is a white male, he's queer, and he's from a lifelong evangelical faith background. "That's what's beautiful about Alexander as a facilitator -- he is a person deeply of faith and that's what the grounding is."

Elizabeth nods enthusiastically. "Edna and I both felt right away just that immediate sense that Alexander feels like one of us even though he's not from our church community. He feels like someone who belongs at All Saints."
"Our tribe," Edna agrees.
"He's very involved in political causes that are really led and pioneered by Black Lives Matter in Los Angeles," says Elizabeth.

They're hoping to follow up in the Spring with another project that will anchor the study of how we're talking about anti-racism and whiteness together. "You don't want to crack people open then just leave them out there," Edna says. "Sometimes people need some guidance like 'I'm here now, what do I do next?'"

Everyone is welcome, and there is something to be gained no matter what, whether you go to one session or all of them. While each session focuses on specific episodes, you will be able to participate even if you haven't listened to them, though Edna and Elizabeth suggest listening to episode \#1 because it's not very long and it will enable a global understanding of the project.
"We also really encourage people, even if they are unable to come to these sessions, to take the time to listen to the podcasts," Edna says, "because they're brilliant. Eye-opening. For everybody, not just whiteidentifying people."

Elizabeth nods. "We recognize this work is never done. It's never finished for us globally, nationally or individually. I think that we as people of faith need to continually invest in creating justice. Please come."
"Yes, come," Edna says. "Everyone should come."
" And...," Elizabeth smiles, "there were really good snacks the first time!

- Session 4 - Where's the Power: Do I Have Any? (Theologies on the margins, Womanist, Liberation, Queer) Leader: Kelly O'Phelan
- Session 5 - Where's the Power: In Love (Grace/unconditional love/how does this drive our work and community forward) Leader: Daniella Baker

## Nuns on the Bus: The Tax Justice Truth Tour

The Nuns on the Bus are on the road again - for the first time in two years - to hold members of Congress accountable for their votes on the 2017 Tax Law and the many attempts to repeal the Affordable Care Act.

Who we elect matters. The Nuns on the Bus: the Tax Justice Truth Tour is traveling from California to Mar-a-Lago ahead of the 2018 midterms to focus on reasonable revenue for responsible programs. The tour will include 54 events in 21 states over the course of 27 days, traveling to congressional districts where the incumbent chose to support the deceitfully named the "Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017." The tour kicks off on Monday, October 8, at 6:00 p.m. with a Town Hall for Justice at All Saints Church, Pasadena.

We are honored to be the venue for the launch of this tour! A centerpiece of the event will be the signing of the bus by all attendees following the town hall in the Church - so we can all accompany them and whoever is at Mar-a-Lago when they arrive will see that you have stood in solidarity with them!
"Last year, Nuns on the Bus stayed in Washington to keep relentless congressional attacks on the common good at bay, but this year we're going on the road to hold members accountable for their votes," said Sister Simone Campbell, SSS, Executive Director of NETWORK Lobby for Catholic Social Justice and Leader of Nuns on the Bus. "When Congress passed this hyper-partisan tax plan into law last fall, we knew it was rooted in the fallacy of trickle-
down economics. Now, we've seen the results of
 structuring
tax policy to favor the biggest corporations and the wealthiest individuals in our nation. That's why Nuns on the Bus are going on the road to Mar-a-Lago to expose the lies of this devastating tax law."
"As we travel from coast to coast, we will focus on the cuts to essential services that are consequences of the tax law, which promotes the perpetuation of an unequal, exclusionary distribution of economic benefit," said NETWORK Grassroots Mobilization Specialist Sister Mary Ellen Lacy, DC. "Our nation was founded not in policies that benefit the few, but on the principle of the common good. This is the vision that we need to recover, to reaffirm that our lawmakers must enact policies that invest in our shared future, not ones that threaten our communities and our families. Educating the American people about this law is the way we can move forward in these turbulent times."
