And the answer remains the same.





Antonio Gallardo Ordination to the Priesthood



Antonio Gallardo will be ordained to the priesthood on Saturday, January 12, 10 a.m., at St. John's Pro-Cathedral in Los Angeles. Antonio earned an M.Div. in a joint program between Bloy House, the Episcopal Theological Seminary at Claremont, and Claremont School of Theology. Since the beginning of his studies Antonio has served as a Pastor at All Saints, working primarily with the Latino-Hispanic Congregation, building toward the realization of All Saints' Vision of a church that reflects the diversity of Pasadena. In 2015 he was appointed Chair of the Task Force for Latino-Hispanic Congregational Development and Sustainability for the National Episcopal Church. Later, Antonio's commitment to a richer Episcopal Church community was recognized in an award from the Episcopal Evangelism Society (EES) to pilot an approach to "Find Mutuality in Christ" between dominant and non-dominant groups in Episcopal congregations.

On Sunday, January 13, Antonio will celebrate at all four services – $^{\circ}_{0}$ 7:30, 9:00, 11:15 a.m. & 1:00 p.m. and we will celebrate his ordination with cake on the lawn after church!

Tracey Lind on January 27th

On Sunday, January 27, we welcome the Reverend Tracey Lind to the Rector's Forum and as our preacher at the 9:00 & 11:15 a.m. services. A long time friend of All Saints Church, Tracey is a retired Episcopal priest and city planner whose ministry has included work for social and environmental justice, interfaith relations, sustainable urban development, arts and culture, and progressive theology. Most recently, Tracey's ministry has extended to include the spiritual insights and lessons she has gained from a life complicated by dementia. On Nov. 8, 2016 (Election Day), Tracey was diagnosed with the early stages of Fronto-temporal Dementia, yet this diagnosis hasn't stopped her from fully immersing in what life has to offer – and what she has to give. She speaks internationally and continues her work as a board member of a variety of nonprofit organizations, including the Episcopal Church Pension Fund, Judson Retirement Services, and Cleveland Neighborhood Progress. She is the author of *Interrupted by God: Glimpses from the Edge*. Don't miss this opportunity to learn from and be inspired by one of the most amazing people we know.



Spotlight by Wendy Edwards Twyla Meyer Tom Schulz

It's not that hard to see why Twyla Meyer says "sleep is overrated" when you hear that she has six jobs! You have seen her at the grand piano in the chancel at All Saints accompanying any one of our choirs with musical sensitivity and complete accuracy. She is every choral conductor's dream! She worked as accompanist in the music department at CSULA for many years and is the principal pianist for the Los Angeles Children's Chorus. The fact that we have had access to her particular gifts for so many years is one thing that has made All Saints' choral music program remarkable.

Of course a piano can't sound good, no matter who's playing it, if it's out of tune. That's where Twyla's husband Tom Schultz comes in. As a Registered Piano Technician his services are in demand in the East San Gabriel Valley where he and Twyla live, but he sometimes travels miles for especially loyal (and even a few famous) clients. The pianos at All Saints benefit regularly from Tom's expertise, too!

I wondered where Tom and Twyla's dedication to making beautiful music came from. Twyla talked about a brother, nine years older, whose band jammed in their living room. She liked it when they played Glenn Miller's "A String of Pearls" and she taught herself to play the melody on the piano. Someone in the band showed her a simple accompaniment for the left hand, and she was off! She would lie in bed at night, singing and figuring out note intervals in other songs she wanted to play when the household was awake. Formal piano lessons pointed her toward reading music rather than playing by ear, but she wishes she'd kept at it. Twyla says that her keen spatial awareness on the keyboard came from playing with her eyes closed. She'd been so impressed when she heard a blind girl play that she decided she wanted to be able to play by "feel," too.

Tom's parents met in their high school choir, and when they married, bought a grand piano before they owned a table! Tom remembers sitting with his ear to the radio on Saturday afternoons in Grand Junction, Colorado, listening to the Texaco broadcast of the Metropolitan Opera. By adolescence, Tom had logged over 500 performances as a boy soprano soloist, including on radio. His voice teacher believed it could harm his adult voice if he sang at all while it was changing, so Tom substituted whistling and became awfully good at it!

Tom came to California for a bachelor's degree in music from La Verne College. He went to grad school at Indiana University and moved back to California to be choral director, voice teacher and music history professor at his alma mater. (It's worth noting that versatile Tom worked as an announcer on classical KUSC until they wanted only bass voices, and later he graduated from PCC as a registered nurse!) In the meantime, Twyla had also made her way to LA from Minnesota in 1974 to get a master's degree at USC. Tom was singing with the Los Angeles Camerata Chorus, and Twyla had just been hired as their accompanist. It must have been a supportive environment for romance, because the Camerata produced six marriages, including Tom and Twyla's!

Tom found All Saints almost by accident. He came to an organ recital and walked to the reception afterwards with organist choirmaster, Ray Egan. Ray invited Tom to come and sing with the summer choir, and that experience led to his current 35+ year tenure with Coventry Choir. He talked Twyla into coming with him, knowing she'd be drawn in by the music. She was raised in the Catholic Church, and found that All Saints' liturgy felt familiar, so she and Tom made it their church home. The two Schultz-Meyer children were baptized here, then became choristers, acolytes and Seekers. Twyla said, "Aidan knows every nook and cranny of this place. Someone would say to me, 'Do you know where your kid is? He's sliding down the bannister to the basement from the third floor of Regas House!" Today Aidan is a professional photographer and church soloist living in Brooklyn, NY. His sister Marike lives in Colorado with her husband and two little girls. She works at Denver's Curious Theatre Company in immersive theatre production.

There's much more to Tom and Twyla's story, but it feels right to close it by sharing something Twyla said: "I'd never want to leave All Saints. I wasn't at all political when I came, but now I spend part of every day as an activist supporting issues I've learned to care about here." Tom agreed, and they both added that despite missing their children and grandchildren, they love southern California and don't imagine they'll move. Aren't we the lucky ones!

Sunday, January 13, 5:00 p.m., on the Chancel. If you could fuse together the lush, rich, vocal style of the great female jazz singers from era's gone by, with the current sound of jazz today -- one might say that **Daniela Spagnolo**'s voice and original songs are a sublime example of just that. With her strong sense of swing and ability to compose songs with a modern flair, she is truly a unique & refreshing collaboration of yesterday and today. Born in Rome, Italy and raised in New York, Daniela quite possibly has one of the most

distinctive and expressive voices in music today.

Guitarist and composer **John Chiodini** began his performing career in clubs, recording studios and theaters throughout New England in the 1960's and 1970's. As a member of the Boston Pops Orchestra under Arthur Fiedler, John made numerous appearances in concerts and on recordings, including the long-running PBS television series "Evening At Pops". In the early 1980's, he relocated to Los Angeles, touring, writing, and recording with Peggy Lee.

Jazz pianist, Grammy Award-winning arranger and All Saints' composer-in-residence **Bill Cunliffe** is widely known for his swinging and lyrical pianism and his creativity and invention

as a composer and arranger of jazz. Bill was the 1989 winner of the \$10,000 Thelonious Monk International Jazz Piano Award, and has received stipends from the National

Making Connections on the Lawn

On Sunday morning the Quad Lawn at All Saints Church is an epicenter of hospitality, information and action. Every week we strive to offer warmth and hospitality for all parishioners – with an intentional welcome to newcomers and first-time visitors – while presenting engaging information about what All Saints stands for and opportunities for action and involvement.

A team of leaders from Congregational Development, Pastoral Care, Health & Healing and Peace & Justice and have worked to assess our current practices and recommend some changes. These changes are based on their evaluation that we can better meet our stated goals with a new lawn configuration and that what we are currently doing does not meet the standard of a cost-effective and sustainable Sunday morning set-up for the Buildings & Grounds staff.

The reconfigured lawn would reduce the number of tables on the lawn and create dedicated intentional space for hospitality.

Guiding Principles of the Lawn Area:

- Welcome newcomers
- Embrace all parishioners with warmth and hospitality create a comfortable place to meet up and greet friends
- Present a view of what all of All Saints stands for and offers a unified picture of our mission
- Provide for cost-effective and sustainable Sunday Morning set-up for the B&G staff
