

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING VOTER REGISTRATION

You may register to vote in California if you are:

- A United States citizen
- At least 18 years of age or older on or before Election Day
- Not in prison/parole for a felony

You should update your registration if you:

- Have moved
- Changed your name
- Changed you political party affiliation
- Completed a felony sentence and are not on parole
- Want to receive election materials in a different language (other than English)
- Your signature has changed since the last time you registered to vote



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING HOW TO VOTE

1. Mail the Vote by Mail Ballot with pre-paid postage envelope through the USPS

- *Use only black or blue ink pen to mark your choice on your ballot.
- Place your voted ballot card(s) in the official return envelope.
- Securely seal the envelope.
- •Sign, date, and provide tour registered address on the back of the envelope in spaces provided.
- Must be postmarked on or before November 3 (no postage necessary).

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING HOW TO VOTE

2. Drop off the Vote By Mail Ballot at any Vote Center or any Vote By Mail Drop Box leading up to and on Election Day

- Place your voted ballot card(s) in the official return envelope.
- Securely seal the envelope.
- •Sign, date, and provide tour registered address on the back of the envelope in spaces provided.
- List of Vote Centers available at lavote.net.
- List of Drop Box locations available at lavote.net.


3. Vote in person at a Vote Center

- Show up to vote between October 24th and November 3rd.
- Vote Centers are open 10 am -7 pm through November 2^{nd} , and 7 am -8 pm on Election Day.
- A poll worker will be able to assist you should you have any issues.
- If you encounter any issues at the Vote Center, you have the right to vote by a provisional ballot.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING IMPORTANT DATES YOU NEED TO KNOW

- 10/5: First day for the mailing of Vote By Mail Ballots to every registered voter in LA County.
- 10/19: Last day to register to vote (note same day voter registration is available at any Vote Center location in LA County).
- 10/24: Vote Center voting (in-person voting) begins at select locations through election day (visit lavote.net for locations).
- 11/3: Election Day! Last day to vote in person. Voting Centers will be open from 7 am 8 pm. Vote By Mail ballots must be postmarked on or before election day. Last day to drop off ballots at any Vote By Mail drop box.

WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT

What Is Prop 15?

Some of you may know it as Schools & Communities First:

- 1. Closes property tax loopholes benefiting wealthy corporations.
- 2. Cuts small business taxes.
- 3. Reclaims roughly \$12 billion every year to invest in California schools and local communities.
- 4. Exempts homeowners, renters, small businesses and agricultural land so they continue to be protected by Prop 13.
- 5. Prioritizes transparency and accountability by requiring public disclosure of all new revenues and how they are spent.



WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT VOTING WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT

What is Prop 20?

- 1. Reducing Crime and Keeping California Safe Act
- 2. Would repeal Prop 47 & 57 these reforms allowed more than 400,000 Californians to reclassify nonviolent felony charges to misdemeanors.
- 3. Prop 20 is pro-criminalization, pro-incarceration and is heavily funded by police unions.

WHAT IS ON THE BALLOT

What is Measure J?

- 1. LA County charter amendment would require that 10% of the unrestricted general funds from the LA County budget, to be appropriated to community investment and alternatives to incarceration.
- 2. Dismantle systemic racism in Los Angeles County by investing in health, housing & jobs for our communities.





Prop 15: Requires commercial and industrial properties to be taxed based on market value and dedicates revenue	YES
Prop 16: Repeals Proposition 209 (1996), which says that the state cannot discriminate or grant preferential treatment based on race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin in public employment, education, or contracting	YES
Prop 17: Restores the right to vote to people convicted of felonies who are on parole	YES
Prop 20: Makes changes to policies related to criminal sentencing charges, prison release, and DNA collection	NO
