Therefore, in our worship, we take our Bible readings from an inclusive language lectionary, which is often truer to original sources in references to people, and expands our concept of God beyond exclusively masculine terms. In Prayer Book liturgies we make minimal but symbolically important changes which denote our commitment to inclusive expression. Some historical texts that are widely known and loved are left unaltered. The words of the liturgy are from the 1979 *Book of Common Prayer*. The readings are from *Lesser Feasts and Fasts*, as well as from *The Inclusive Hebrew Scriptures and New Testament* published by *Priests for Equality*.


Up To the Mountain

VOLUNTARY

Ms. Patty Griffin's composition is a contemporary folk song that evokes emotions surrounding Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s famous 1968 "I've Been to the Mountaintop" speech, delivered the day before his assassination in Memphis, Tennessee. *Ms.* Griffin was inspired by the sentiments in Dr. King's speech and a Bible story, saying she had never felt brave until she wrote the song. She uses visual, naturalistic imagery to describe various states of mind expressed in the speech, but with a generality that could extend to other contexts.

"Leaning on the Everlasting Arms" (also known as "What A Fellowship") was first published in 1887 by white Presbyterian ministers Rev. Elisha Hoffman and Mr. Anthony J. Showalter. The lyrics convey that people can lean on Christ during times of trouble. It was written after Mr. Showalter received letters from two former students informing him that their wives had died and they were seeking consolation. The song complements cultures with roots in oral tradition, making it easy to memorize. It eventually became a gospel icon, featured in dozens of films and an iconic solo recording by Miss Mahalia Jackson.

Dr. Carl W. Haywood is an eminent composer, arranger of sacred music, and a well-known conductor, teacher, and church musician. His work is significant in the Episcopal Church, where he was an editor and leading contributor to the African American hymnal "Lift Every Voice and Sing." He is a member of dozens of prestigious associations, including the National Association of Negro Musicians. His setting of the Gloria was sung at the Washington National Cathedral for the Absalom Jones Celebration in 2016.

A Reading from Exodus (3:7–12).

Our God said to Moses, "I have seen the affliction of my people in Egypt; I have heard their cries under those who oppress them; I have felt their sufferings. Now I have come down to rescue them from the hand of Egypt, out of their place of suffering, and bring them to a place that is wide and fertile, a land flowing with milk and honey – the land of the Canaanites, the Hittites, the Amorites, the Perizzites, the Hivites, and the Jebusites. The cry of the children of Israel has reached me, and I have watched how the Egyptians are oppressing them. Now, go! I will send you to Pharaoh, to bring my people, the children of Israel, out of Egypt." But Moses said to God, "Who am I, that I should go to Pharaoh and lead the children of Israel out of Egypt?" God answered, "I will be with you, and this is the sign by which you will know that it is I who have sent you: after you bring my people out of Egypt, you will all worship at this very mountain."

LESSON Remain seated.

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians (6:10–20).

Draw your strength from Christ and from the strength of that mighty power. Put on the full armor of God so that you can stand firm against the tactics of the Devil. Our battle ultimately is not against human forces, but against the sovereignties and powers, the rulers of the world of darkness, and the evil spirits of the heavenly realms. You must put on the armor of God if you are to resist on the evil day and, having done everything you can, to hold your ground. Stand fast then, with truth as the belt around your waist, justice as your breastplate, and zeal to spread the Good News of peace as your footgear. In all circumstances, hold faith up before you as your shield; it will help you extinguish the fiery darts of the Evil One. Put on the helmet of salvation, and carry the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. Always pray in the Spirit, with all your prayers and petitions. Pray constantly and attentively for all God's holy people. Pray also for me, that God will open my mouth and put words on my lips, that I may boldly make known the mystery of the Good News-that mystery for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may have courage to proclaim it as I ought.

A Reading from Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

I am convinced that if we are to get on the right side of the world revolution, we as a nation must undergo a radical revolution of values. We must rapidly begin the shift from a thing-oriented society to a person-oriented society. When machines and computers, profit motives and property rights, are considered more important than people, the giant triplets of racism, extreme materialism, and militarism are incapable of being conquered. A true revolution of values will soon cause us to question the fairness and justice of many of our past and present policies.

On the one hand we are called to play the Good Samaritan on life's roadside, but that will be only an initial act. One day we must come to see that the whole Jericho Road must be transformed so that men and women will not be constantly beaten and robbed as they make their journey on life's highway. True compassion is more than flinging a coin to a beggar. It comes to see that an edifice which produces beggars needs restructuring. A true revolution of values will soon look uneasily on the glaring contrast of poverty and wealth. With righteous indignation, it will look across the seas and see individual capitalists of the West investing huge sums of money in Asia, Africa, and South America, only to take the profits out with no concern for the social betterment of the countries, and say: "This is not just." It will look at our alliance with the landed gentry of South America and say: "This is not just." The Western arrogance of feeling that it has everything to teach others and nothing to learn from them is not just. A true revolution of values will lay hands on the world order and say of war: "This way of settling differences is not just." This business of burning human beings with napalm, of filling our nation's homes with orphans and widows, of injecting poisonous drugs of hate into the veins of peoples normally humane, of sending men home from dark and bloody battlefields physically handicapped and psychologically deranged, cannot be reconciled with wisdom, justice, and love. A nation that continues year after year to spend more money on military defense than on programs of social uplift is approaching spiritual death. America, the richest and most powerful nation in the world, can well lead the way in this revolution of values. There is nothing except a tragic death wish to prevent us from reordering our priorities, so that the pursuit of peace will take precedence over the pursuit of war. There is nothing to keep us from molding a recalcitrant status quo with bruised hands until we have fashioned it into a brotherhood. This kind of positive revolution of values is our best defense..... War is not the answer.

Give, and it will be given to you: a full measure – pressed down, shaken together and running over – will be poured into your lap. For the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back."

Mr. Richard Smallwood graduated cum laude from Howard University with a dual B.A. degree in classical vocal performance and piano. Among Mr. Smallwood's most popular songs is "I Love the Lord," popularized by singer Ms. Whitney Houston in the film "The Preacher's Wife." The lyrics are based on the first stanza of a poem by Rev. Isaac Watts, which is a paraphrase of Psalm 116. The poem expresses that when people cry out to God, God hears them and takes their grief.



CONSECRATION Kneeling or standing — all who are able.

Priest: Holy and gracious God: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Creator of all.

Jesus stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect self-offering for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Priest and People:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

Priest: We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O God, in this offering of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling Christ's life, death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Priest and People:

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in Christ. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kindom.

Whoever you are and wherever you are on your journey of faith, there is a place for you at Christ's table. When it comes time for communion, everyone of any age is welcome to receive either communion or a blessing.

If you wish to receive the bread, when you come to the front you may kneel or stand at the altar rail and hold your hands together in front of you to receive the bread.

If you wish to receive wine, help guide the cup to your lips or, if you prefer not to receive the wine, you may touch the base of the cup when it is presented to you.

If you wish to receive a blessing, when you come to the front, cross your arms over your chest, and you will be offered a blessing.

Gluten-free wafers and grape juice are available at your request on the back side rails.

By tradition, The Episcopal Church offers Holy Communion to all baptized persons. If you are not baptized, but wish to receive, we invite you to participate fully in the opening part of the service, called the Ministry of the Word, hearing God's word and reflecting on your life, enabling you to come to the table for communion, if you so choose, with a heart prepared to receive. 

MLK

"MLK" is a song by Irish rock band U2 written as an elegy to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. It was because of this song, and "Pride (In the Name of Love)," another tribute to Dr. King, that lead vocalist Bono received the highest honor of the King Center for Nonviolent Social Change, an organization founded by Mrs. Coretta Scott King. Mr. Bob Chilcott is a wellknown British choral composer, conductor, singer, and former member of the King's Singers from 1985 to 1997.




HYMN "We Shall Overcome" Everyone sings.

"We Shall Overcome" is a civil rights anthem with roots in European songs from the 1700s, African American gospel music, including the hymn – "I'll Overcome Someday" composed by Rev. Charles Albert Tindley (a free Black man during enslavement in the US), and work songs. The song was first used politically in 1945 during a labor strike against American Tobacco in Charleston, SC. The workers sang, "We will overcome, and we will win our rights someday" on the picket line. Ms. Lucille Simmons, a picketer, is credited with changing the lyrics from "I" to "We." Mr. Pete Seeger sang it during a 1957 appearance by Dr. King at a Tennessee school. Later that day, Dr. King found himself humming the tune in the car. "There's something about that song that haunts you," he told his companions. The song spread rapidly as the 1950s and 1960s Civil Rights Movement gained momentum; protesters worldwide still sing it.

Georgia native Rev. Thomas Dorsey (1899–1993) was called "the father of gospel music." From the 1930s to the 1970s, he served as the music director of Pilgrim Baptist Church in Chicago, where he wrote "Precious Lord," which draws heavily from the 1844 hymn "Maitland." This moving hymn was Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr's favorite song. At his request, gospel singer Miss Mahalia Jackson often sang it at civil rights rallies in the 1950s and 1960s to inspire civil rights activists in their fight. On April 4, 1968, Dr. King's last words were a request for this song, which Miss Jackson sang at his funeral in Atlanta.

The words invoke a spirit of hope and faith in God and express a sense of pride in heritage and national identity. It is most often referred to as the Black National Anthem.



"This Little Light of Mine" is a powerful and enduring gospel song with deep roots in African American church traditions. During the 1950s and 1960s Civil Rights Movement, it was sung by countless individuals marching for justice, representing the belief that each person has the capacity to make a difference and shine with purpose.

Olga Tokarczuk, Drive Your Plow Over the Bones of the Dead (2009; U.S. trans. 2019). Tokarczuk won the Nobel Prize for Literature in 2018. In 2019, the British Guardian ranked it 75th among the 100 best books—not just novels—of the twenty-first century. It said, "In this existential eco-thriller, a William Blake-obsessed eccentric investigates the murders of men and animals in a remote Polish village. The book is an examination of how atavistic male impulses, emboldened by the new rightwing politics of Europe, are endangering people, communities and nature itself." In the New Yorker, Jia Tolentino called the book "exhilarating in a way that feels fierce and private, almost inarticulable; it's one of the most existentially refreshing novels I've read in a long time."

South Pasadena, El Serreno, or Glendale.



Both floor space and chairs will be available. Bring whatever you need to be comfortable including yoga mats, blankets, and pillows.




The Interfaith Study Group presents Islam — Behind the Headlines with Dr. Ahmed Sobah



Jonathan Stoner explores the universal nature of grief — whether personal, societal, or global. It delves into the layered experiences of grief in conflict zones like Gaza, Ukraine, Sudan, and Post-inauguration in the USA as well as the shared human need

for connection and healing. Drawing on stories, reflections, and lessons Jonathan invites us to consider how we might transform grief into action and hope, fostering resilience across divides.





What is Sacred Ground?

Sacred Ground is a film-and-readings-based dialogue series on race, grounded in faith. Small groups are invited to walk through chapters of America's history of race and racism, while weaving in threads of family story, economic class, and political and regional identity. Part of Becoming Beloved Community — The Episcopal Church's long-term commitment to racial healing, reconciliation, and justice in our personal lives, our ministries, and our society — the 11-part series is built around a powerful online curriculum of documentary films and readings that focus on

Indigenous, Black, Latino, and Asian/Pacific American histories as they intersect with European American histories.

The series is open to all, and especially designed to help white people talk with other white people. Participants are invited to peel away the layers that have contributed to the challenges and divides of the present day – all while grounded in our call to faith, hope and love.

Sacred Ground is not brand new to All Saints Church. In 2021 a number of parish leaders and staff members assisted in introducing the program here in the Diocese of Los Angeles. Many of those who participated at that time were hoping to widen the circle by creating a parish-wide opportunity to engage with the material.

Who created Sacred Ground and Why?

The dialogue series developer and author is Katrina Browne, producer/director of the documentary Traces of the Trade: A Story from the Deep North. Browne is a lifelong Episcopalian who is dedicated to racial justice and healing. As a white woman, she is particularly concerned with the important work white people need to do in conversation with each other, as part of the larger project of Becoming Beloved Community. **More here:** *https://www.episcopalchurch.org/sacred-ground/about/*

When is Sacred Ground Coming to All Saints Church?

There will be opportunities for both in person and online, daytime and evening, weekday and weekend groups.(Please Note: We have extended our roll out timeline due to the challenges of the Eaton Canyon disaster.)

Trained facilitators will be working in collaboration with Sacred Ground Coordinators MaryAnn Ahart and Lori Kizzia and under the direction of staff member Thomas Diaz, Director of Connection & Care.
