The seeds for Dunitz & Company were planted more than 30 years ago when founder Nancy Dunitz visited Guatemala for the first time. "I had been working in finance and longed to explore the world and focus on my creative side. A vacation took me to Guatemala and I've been working there ever since."

While touring Guatemala, Nancy encountered countless talented artisans weaving, painting and carving. Because of political unrest, the country offered minimal tourism trade and few outlets for selling their beautiful wares. Nancy's vision was to work with artisans fine tuning designs that would appeal to buyers in the US. She knew that this would create opportunity for many who would otherwise not have it.

During the early stages of Dunitz & Company, Nancy met two artists who introduced beading techniques to a few Mayan people. She began collaborating with these creative indivduals, and soon a viable and sustaining business was born. "We were on the ground floor," comments Nancy. "Beading was a new medium in Guatemala and by creating fashion-forward designs, I knew I could also create demand."

Since that time, Dunitz has introduced countless beaded collections that have consistently employed well over one hundred individuals. In 2011, Dunitz & Company introduced the Joanie M collection, named to honor Nancy's mother. This beautiful fused-glass jewelry line is also handmade in Guatemala. The line was born when Nancy saw tremendous potential in the glass work of a local artisan named Rosa and began collaborating with her. Since that time, Nancy and Rosa have developed ceramic and laser cut jewelry collections. These colorful collections of jewelry they developed has delighted many of our customers and created a sustainable business for Rosa and her staff.

Dunitz & Company is a proud and vetted member of the <u>Fair Trade Federation</u> and <u>Museum Store Association</u>, a Gold Certified Business member of <u>Green America</u> and a founding member of <u>Fair Trade Los Angeles</u>.

#### **Our Mission Statement**

Friends in Deed is an interfaith organization that provides supportive services to meet basic human needs, so our homeless and at-risk neighbors can rebuild their lives.

#### COMPASSION CONNECTION DIGNITY

The Food Pantry provides food assistance to low-income and no-income families in the greater Pasadena/Altadena area. Our households are made up of "working poor" individuals, senior citizens and people with disabilities on fixed incomes, and those who are experiencing homelessness.

Founded in 2007, **The Women's Room (TWR)** is the only organization in the San Gabriel Valley dedicated to serving women who are alone and homeless or at risk of homelessness. It is a daytime refuge known for wrapping its arms around the 20 to 35 women who come through the door each day, making them feel whole and appreciated. The program includes supportive services and basic needs: a shower, laundry and healthy food.

The Pasadena **Bad Weather Shelter (BWS)** is a Friends In Deed program that provides shelter for homeless individuals during the winter season. For the last few years, the Bad Weather Shelter has been weather activated (a forecast of 40 degrees or below and/or 40% chance of rain)

Friends In Deed's **Homeless Prevention program** provides short-term and medium-term rental support, as well as move-in assistance, to individuals and families on the brink of becoming homeless. Nearly 70 individuals and families benefit from this program each year. This is a critical program because studies show that keeping a person housed is cheaper and more effective than trying to help someone get housed in the first place.

Friends In Deed's **Street Outreach Program** identifies chronically homeless individuals, on the streets of Pasadena, and works to build trust and relationships with them. The Outreach team's primary goal is to enter these folks into the Coordinated Entry System, which is the pathway to permanent supportive housing.

In 2014, Vivien Sansour founded the *Palestine Heirloom Seed Library*. The *Library* and its *Traveling Kitchen Project* seek to preserve and promote threatened seed varieties, traditional Palestinian farming practices, and the cultural identities associated with them.



Based in the village of Battir, a UNESCO World Heritage site outside Bethlehem, the Library also serves as home to *El Beir Arts & Seeds*, a space for collaborations with artists, poets, writers, journalists, and others to showcase and promote their talents and work.

Working closely with farmers, the Library has identified key seed varieties and food crops that are threatened with extinction and would provide opportunities to inspire local farmers and community

#### MISSION STATEMENT

Thanks to the generous support of our donors, Peace Sisters has been able to increase the number of students we reach to over 480 girls in Dapaong, Togo (West Africa). All the students who receive our assistance are underprivileged in some way - whether as orphans or by some other family struggle - and many of them would have discontinued their studies by now if it were not for the assistance of Peace Sisters.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAMS TO SUPPORT**

<u>School Fees</u>: The primary role that Peace Sisters plays in Togo is to pay school fees for girls who cannot afford this expense. We also provide school supplies and solar study lamps to improve the quality of their education, and we have begun providing menstrual pads and basic health insurance to prevent absenteeism. A year of middle/high school is estimated to cost \$40/girl.

<u>Higher Education</u>: In 2021, Peace Sisters was thrilled to celebrate the first College Graduation for a student in our program! We anticipate that about 45 girls will pursue a higher education this year, and we are currently expanding our fundraising to ensure we can help them attain their dreams. A year of school for each girl at the university level is estimated to cost \$1,000.

<u>Computer Lab</u>: As the young women in our program have continued on to college, it has been observed that many were at a disadvantage in their new environments because they had not previously received any computer training. To address this need, we recently opened a new computer lab in Dapaong, and now 450+ girls (who had never before touched a keyboard!) have access to our computer lab. We plan to expand this program in the near future.

#### The Running Stitch | Quilting Collective

Core and present collective:

The running stitch is a community of Los Angeles based Muslim women from different countries, who came together in 2001 for the love of quilting, sewing, crocheting and knitting. They meet once a week to work together, laugh out loud, share food and stories, drink tea and create. Having a surfeit of tantalizing donated fabric, from clothing business samples and outmoded garments of friends and family, they skillfully repurpose these discards into works of art such as rich, colorful quilts. The *running stitch* is their signature on their quilts. With time they have attracted friends and family to join them in stitching together and thereby extending the circle of friendship and camaraderie.

Mostly selling their quilts at various charitable fundraisers, organizers would ask who they were, what they were called, but they had no name or particular interest in naming themselves: they were simply a collective of sewing friends. Forced to choose a name they picked "Tuesdays," since that was the day, they met weekly. In 2016 when their work was chosen for an exhibition by the Pakistan Arts Council at the Pacific Asia Museum Pasadena, they decided to name themselves "the running stitch" since it was the common thread (pun intended) on all their work, large or small.

Born of community, sharing and building relationships through an artistic medium that spans generations of women, the group has been able to sell their work and

support various charitable projects around the world, close to each one's heart. Their quilts have supported causes such as survivors of the earthquake in Baam, Iran in 2003; building accessible homes for women who sustained spinal cord injuries in Pakistan's earthquake in 2005; survivors of hurricane Katrina in 2006, assistance to flood victims in Bangladesh, and other natural and manmade disasters at home and internationally. Barring a five-month covid-19 hiatus in early 2020, what each of them brings to the process and the interplay within the group, is a testament to their having thrived for this many years.







Union Station Homeless Services has been serving our community for almost 50 years. As the lead agency coordinating homeless services in the San Gabriel Valley, we serve a region with a combined population of over 1.5 million across more than 36 cities and communities through our four pillars of service -- Outreach, Interim Housing, Housing, and Community Integration.

## IMPACT Community ~

**\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*** 

You have heard the saying, "Don't give fish teach them fish." IMPACT Community was born in 2007 in response to an unaddressed question coming from the rural Dalit communities, "Where Are The Fish Ponds?"

The ownership of the resources, and the power to hire, fire, and exploit are invariably in the hands of the people and those who believe in their entitlements by birth as upper caste. Likewise, the rural landless Dalits are born at the bottom of the socio-religious hierarchy to inherited untouchability and inherited poverty. Their lot is exploitation, malnutrition, lack of proper quality education and skills, and lack of legal defense, just to name a few.

Rev. BM Sudheer and Rev Dr. Regina Sudheer, the co-founders of IMPACT Community work in 30 villages in the States of Telangana and Andhra Pradesh, South India. They both are pastors, lawyers, and educators. They specifically work with the most exploited and weakest section of rural Indian society, the landless Dalits and the marginalized.

Sudheer's legal representations (pro bono) of the exploited Dalits continue to help many families. Regina's management of two mission schools, the sewing center, and an experimental farm along with their combined efforts of awareness through workshops, seminars, etc. bring enlightenment and give direction to these communities, especially their youth.

The work option for rural men and "working" women who prefer to stay in their villages is 6-9 months of hard, back-breaking seasonal fieldwork for the upper caste landlords along with its baggage of indignities and living from season to season. Some youths work as electricians, plumbers, or painters. Some men go to towns to work on construction sites. They often waste their income on palm toddy or moonshine.

After due research IMPACT Bags began in 2009 to provide alternate training in sewing (not tailoring) for semi-literate Dalit women with an option for after-training employment at our Violet Training Center with a fair and regular income in a safe workplace along with basic healthcare.


Beginning with one village we slowly expanded to two. However, COVID and the extended severe lockdown in India impacted the work. We could not function for two years. We restarted last year and are rebuilding this work. We have continued to help and strengthen the impacted families. The mothers have been able to send their children to schools providing better education; the quality of food has improved in these homes; and the women who often sacrificed their own meals to feed their children are now getting sufficient nutrition and are finally able to save some funds for later.


